FASD is 100% **Preventable** but unfortunately it is **Not Curable**.

The **ONLY** way to prevent FASD is to abstain from alcohol. This is the safest option because in many cases of pregnancy the mother is unaware that she is pregnant for the first trimester. **Best practice is to avoid all alcohol if you are planning to get pregnant, or not using contraception. Drinking alcohol during this period may cause FASD.**

FASD—The preventable scourge

DEFINITION: FASD is an umbrella term for a range of physical and mental effects caused by alcohol taken by a woman during pregnancy and breastfeeding.

ders (FASD) is one of the costly by-products of alcohol consumption. It is

“an umbrella term used to describe a range of disabilities and a continuum of effects that may arise from prenatal alcohol exposure and it is widely recognized as the most common preventable cause of birth defects and brain damage in children.”³ FASD is not a diagnosis in itself; it includes a range of diagnoses such as:

- FAS (Fetal Alcohol Syndrome)
- PFAS (partial Fetal Alcohol Syndrome)
- ARND (Alcohol Related Neurodevelopmental Disorders)
- ARBD (Alcohol Related Birth Defects)

Alcohol is a **Teratogenic** ⁴ substance. This means that alcohol crosses the placental barrier and interferes with the normal formation of the embryo causing malformations of the child in the womb.

The term Teratogenic is usually reserved for debilitating diseases such as Rubella and such horrors as the so called ‘wonder drug’ **Thalidomide** which was patented in 1957

by the German Pharmaceutical company Grunenthal as an *antiemetic* substance (i.e. it alleviated symptoms of morning sickness). At this time it was thought as unlikely that any drug could cross the placental barrier. Between 1950 & 1960 over 10,000 children in 46 countries were born with deformities due to this drug. These children were called Thalidomide babies.⁵

Thalidomide became known as one of the most infamous **Teratogenic** substances and “one of the biggest medical tragedies of modern times”⁶. It caused ‘**phocomelia**’ (McGraw-Hill Concise Dictionary of Modern Medicine. © 2002) ‘or ‘flipper baby’ syndrome.’⁷

Imagine if we were told today that Thalidomide would be put back on the market as a morning sickness drug? The thought of this is unthinkable! The entire nation would be up in arms, women everywhere would rise up against such a policy...yet, with hardly a whimper we allow

a powerful Teratogen – Alcohol with no warnings on it to be easily accessible to any woman over 18 years of age.
